# Where to start

- Today I'll start with audio, because it's easy to represent mathematically, and relatively easy to display & understand.
- There are three types of audio you need to know about:
  - Impulses – an impulse is an instantaneous spike. Sounds like a click.
  - Sinusoids – sounds like a pure tone.
  - Noises – a random signal. Exact value of the signal can't be predicted, but its expected value and variance can be predicted.
- This class will start out with sinusoids, then impulses, then noises.

# Tools

- The first tool you need to understand is python. If you have never used python, you will need to learn! I recommend that you work through all of the examples in the standard tutorial, at least up through the end of section 5 “Data Structures:”

- For now, I recommend that use Jupyter, which allows you to run the code in your web browser: <https://jupyter.org/>
- I run Jupyter using anaconda. Anaconda is a company, but their individual license is still free. It’s useful because, if you install using anaconda, many things just magically work. But it’s no longer necessary; if you have any other version of python installed, you should be able to get jupyter using `pip install jupyterlab`.

# notebook\_lec01.ipynb

OK, now let's run notebook\_lec01.ipynb. Here's the procedure I use:

1. Unpack this zip file, including notebook\_lec01.ipynb, into some directory on your computer.
2. Open a terminal window, and cd to that directory.
3. Type `jupyter-lab` in your terminal window. That will start Jupyter, and open your web browser, so you can see and run the code.

# Praat

Once you've run `notebook_lec01.ipynb`, then you have three new audio files that you can open and explore. I recommend that you download and try Praat. Everything that's possible in Praat is also possible in python, so installing Praat is not necessary, but some things are more convenient in Praat.
