## Overview

- Springs
$\rightarrow$ Force is proportional to displacement
$\rightarrow \mathrm{F}=-\mathrm{kx}$ (- means if you pull in +x direction spring pulls back in -x direction)
$\rightarrow \mathrm{U}=1 / 2 \mathrm{k} \mathrm{x}^{2}$ (potential energy stored in spring; spring forces are conservative)

## Springs

- Hooke's Law: The force exerted by a spring is proportional to the distance the spring is stretched or compressed from its relaxed position.

$$
\begin{aligned}
F=-k x & \text { Where } x \text { is the displacement from } \\
& \text { the relaxed position and } k \text { is the } \\
& \text { constant of proportionality. }
\end{aligned}
$$



## Clicker Q

## Springs

- Hooke's Law: The force exerted by a spring is proportional to the distance the spring is stretched or compressed from its relaxed position.

$$
\begin{aligned}
F=-k x & \text { Where } x \text { is the displacement from } \\
& \text { the relaxed position and } k \text { is the } \\
& \text { constant of proportionality. }
\end{aligned}
$$

If compressed, force points in positive x direction
$\int$ relaxed position


## Potential Energy in Spring

- Hooke's Law force is Conservative: Work done by springs does not depend on path
$\rightarrow \mathrm{F}=-\mathrm{kx}$
$\rightarrow \mathrm{W}=-1 / 2 \mathrm{k} \mathrm{x}^{2}$

$\rightarrow$ Work done only depends on initial and final position
$\rightarrow$ Define Potential Energy $\mathrm{U}_{\text {spring }}=1 / 2 \mathrm{k} \mathrm{x}^{2}$


## Simple Harmonic Motion

- Vibrations
$\rightarrow$ Vocal cords when singing/speaking
$\rightarrow$ String/rubber band
- Simple Harmonic Motion
$\rightarrow$ Restoring force proportional to displacement
$\rightarrow$ Springs F = -kx

## Springs and Simple Harmonic Motion



## Simple Harmonic Motion:

$$
\begin{array}{lll}
x(t)=[A] \cos (\omega t) & x(t)=[A] \sin (\omega t) \\
v(t)=-[A \omega] \sin (\omega t) & \text { OR } & v(t)=[A \omega] \cos (\omega t) \\
a(t)=-\left[A \omega^{2}\right] \cos (\omega t) & & a(t)=-\left[A \omega^{2}\right] \sin (\omega t)
\end{array}
$$

Period $=T$ (seconds per cycle)
$x_{\max }=A$
Frequency $=f=1 / T($ cycles per second $)$
$v_{\text {max }}=A \omega$
Angular frequency $=\omega=2 \pi f=2 \pi / T$
$a_{\max }=A \omega^{2}$

## Energy

- A mass is attached to a spring and set to motion. The maximum displacement is $x=A$
$\rightarrow$ Apply Work-Kinetic Energy Thm: $\mathrm{W}_{\mathrm{nc}}=\Delta \mathrm{E}=\Delta(\mathrm{K}+\mathrm{U})$
$\rightarrow \quad 0=\Delta(\mathrm{K}+\mathrm{U})$ or Energy, $\mathrm{U}+\mathrm{K}$, is constant!

$$
\text { Energy }=1 / 2 \mathrm{~m} \mathrm{v}^{2}+1 / 2 \mathrm{k} \mathrm{x}^{2}
$$

$\rightarrow$ At maximum displacement $\mathrm{x}=\mathrm{A}, \mathrm{v}=0$


Since Total Energy is same

$$
\begin{aligned}
& 1 / 2 \mathrm{kA}^{2}=1 / 2 \mathrm{~m}_{\max }^{2} \\
& \mathrm{v}_{\max }=\mathrm{A} \operatorname{sqrt}(\mathrm{k} / \mathrm{m})=\mathrm{A} \omega
\end{aligned}
$$

Same as in last slide

## Summary

- Springs
$\rightarrow \mathrm{F}=-\mathrm{kx}$
$\rightarrow \mathrm{U}=1 / 2 \mathrm{kx} \mathrm{x}^{2}$
$\rightarrow \omega=\operatorname{sqrt}(\mathrm{k} / \mathrm{m}), \omega=2 \pi \mathrm{f}=2 \pi / \mathrm{T}, \mathrm{f}=1 / \mathrm{T}$
- Simple Harmonic Motion
$\rightarrow$ Occurs when have linear restoring force $\mathrm{F}=-\mathrm{kx}$
$\rightarrow \mathrm{x}(\mathrm{t})=[\mathrm{A}] \cos (\omega \mathrm{t}) \quad$ or $\quad[\mathrm{A}] \sin (\omega \mathrm{t})$
$\rightarrow \mathrm{v}(\mathrm{t})=-[\mathrm{A} \omega] \sin (\omega \mathrm{t})$ or $\quad[\mathrm{A} \omega] \cos (\omega \mathrm{t})$
$\rightarrow \mathrm{a}(\mathrm{t})=-\left[\mathrm{A} \omega^{2}\right] \cos (\omega \mathrm{t})$ or $\quad-\left[\mathrm{A} \omega^{2}\right] \sin (\omega \mathrm{t})$
